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A Word About Communion (Holy Eucharist)

+Holy Communion - Why Only For The Orthodox Christian?+

Welcome to St. Paul Antiochian Orthodox Church. We are honored by your presence. It is our sincere desire that your participation today in the Divine Liturgy will draw you closer to Christ and His Church.

The Orthodox Church understands the Eucharist, or Lord's Supper, to be the paramount expression of Christian unity. While it is our deepest hope that Christendom will one day fulfill Christ's desire for true unity among all those who claim His name (John 17:21), the unfortunate reality of our day is that the various segments of Christendom are not unified with the historic Orthodox faith. Since participation in the Eucharist (Holy Communion) expresses a unity with **all the dogma, teachings, and practice of the Orthodox Church**, it is obvious that non-Orthodox Christians (Catholic, Protestant, Oriental, etc.) **do not** receive Holy Communion but respect the official policy of the Antiochian Archdiocese of North America.

Thank you for your understanding.

On that same note, all **Eastern Orthodox Christians** are called to prepare for the receiving of the Body and Blood of Christ through recent confession, prayer, and fasting from all food and drink approximately midnight the night before. Please speak with Fr. Paul if medical conditions preclude it.

Fr. Paul is available after the service, or by appointment, to answer questions you may have about any facet of the Orthodox Christian faith.

The Reading from the First Epistle of St. Paul to St. Timothy. (4:9-15)

Let no one despise your youth, but set the believers an example in speech and conduct, in love, in faith, in purity. Until I come, attend to the public reading of scripture, to preaching, to teaching. Do not neglect the gift you have, which was given you by prophetic utterance when the council of elders laid their hands upon you. Practice these duties; devote yourself to them, so that all may see your progress.



THE SYNAXARION

(AN ABRIDGED COLLECTION OF THE "LIVES OF THE SAINTS")

THE GOSPEL

(For the fifteenth Sunday of Luke - "Zacchaeus Sunday")

The Reading is from the Holy Gospel according St. Luke. (19:1-10)

At that time, Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through. And there was a man

named Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector, and rich. And he sought to see Who Jesus was, but could not, on account of the crowd, because he was small of stature. So he ran on ahead and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see Jesus, for He was to pass that way. And when Jesus came to the place, He looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, make haste and come down; for I must stay at your house today." So he made haste and came down, and received Him joyfully. And when they saw it they all murmured, "He has gone in to be the guest of a man who is a sinner." And Zacchaeus stood and said to the Lord, "Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor; and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I restore it fourfold." And Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, since he also is a son of Abraham; for the Son of man came to seek and to save the lost."

On January 21 in the Holy Orthodox Church, we commemorate our righteous Father Maximos the Confessor.

Maximos was born in Constantinople. First, he was a high-ranking courtier for Emperor Heraclius and, after that, a monk and abbot of a monastery not too far from the capitol. He was the greatest defender of Orthodoxy against the so-called Monothelite heresy which proceeded from the heresy of Eutyches. He claimed that there is only one nature in Christ (Monophysitism), so the Monothelites claimed that there is only one will in Christ (Monothelitism). Maximos opposed that claim and found himself as an opponent of the emperor and the patriarch. Maximos did not frighten easily but endured to the end in proving that there were two wills as well as two natures in Christ. Because of his efforts, a council was held in Carthage and another in Rome. Both councils anathematized the teachings of the Monothelites.

Maximos suffered greatly for Orthodoxy: he was tortured by princes, deceived by prelates, spat upon by the masses of the people, beaten by soldiers, exiled, imprisoned, until finally, with a severed tongue and hand, he was condemned to exile for life in the land of Skhemaris (near Batum on the Black Sea) where he spent three years in prison and gave up his soul to God in the mid-seventh century.

On this day, we also commemorate the Martyr Neophytos of Nicaea; Venerable Zosimas, Bishop of Syracuse in Sicily; and Venerable Maximos the Greek of Russia.

By their intercessions, O Christ God, have mercy upon us. Amen.

Spirit-Filled Words from St. Paisios of Mt. Athos (1924-1994)

"Spiritual Joy"

THAT THERE IS TRUE JOY WHENEVER CHRIST IS PRESENT

St. Paisios responds to the comment: "Geronta, there are times I cannot be joyful, and then I think perhaps joy is not for me."

What are you saying? There is no joy for you? And who is it for, the devil? Have you lost your mind? Joy is for all people. God has not given sorrow. He has only given joy... When your mind is not on God, how can you feel the joy of God? As your mind is constantly fixed on chores and the daily machinery of life, you forget Christ and your spiritual machinery stops working. Start up the Jesus Prayer(*) and the soft chanting, and then you will take off and spin like a top around Christ."

It is only near Christ that one can find actual and genuine joy, because only Christ gives actual joy and consolation. Wherever Christ is present, that is where true joy and the delight of Paradise are present. Those who are far from Christ do not have true joy. They make plans and dream: 'I will do this. I will do that? I will go here. I will go there.' They enjoy worldly honors, or attend all sorts of events, and be happy, but the <a href="happiness they feel cannot fill their soul." happiness they feel cannot fill their soul." happiness they feel cannot fill their soul."

That type of joy is material, worldly joy. The soul, however, is not fulfilled by material joys, and one is then left with a void in his heart. Have you seen what Solomon says? I made me great works; I builded me houses; I planted me vineyards, I made me gardens... I gathered me also silver and gold... And whatever mine eyes desired, I kept not from them ... and, behold, all was vanity and vexation of spirit, and there was no profit under the sun' [Cf. Eccl. 2:4-11]."

"Worldly joy provides something temporary, something ephemeral for the moment. It cannot provide what spiritual joy provides. Spiritual joy is life in Paradise. Those who have first gone through the Crucifixion, and have been resurrected spiritually, live in the joy of Pascha: 'Pascha, the Pascha of the Lord!' And then comes Pentecost!... And when they come to Pentecost and receive the fiery tongue, the Holy Spirit, then everything comes to an end..."(**)

(*)"Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner. Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God..."

(**) - Those words of the Saint express the ultimate purpose of the spiritual struggle of each person: to acquire the Holy Spirit. When a person becomes a communicant of the deifying Grace of the Holy Spirit, he reaches the state of "theosis" — deification, the state of "endless perfection."
